## Are you ready for 2023?

I am honored to have served as your NHPA President during the past 14 months. I have faced many unusual challenges during this time. The most challenging issue was the Covid outbreak at the World Tournament in Monroe, Louisiana. Despite the illness of both officers and participants, we were able to complete the tournament. I owe a special thanks to the Council members who worked many hours during this difficult time. Blaine Scott was a key contributor to our success.



I am now dealing with the challenge of getting adequate bids for the 2024 World Tournament.

As I indicated in my last message, we have many challenges as we begin the new year. Membership, promotion, and sponsorship are the obvious areas that must be addressed. Unfortunately, we experienced another small loss of membership in 2022. In the area of promotion, we have been in talks with GoLive Sports to potentially film a game at the 2023 World Tournament. This company has been instrumental in getting other minor sports televised. We must pursue many other promotional opportunities. Future strategies will include a much better social media presence, production of promotional videos, and the development of a focused approach to getting sponsorship. Widely distributing video coverage of the 2023 World Championships will also be a good promotional opportunity.

One area of promotion that I believe would be helpful is recognition and support of major tournaments like the Valley of the Sun in Arizona, the New England Championships, and the Greenville Ringer Classic in Ohio. Obviously, there are people who have worked very hard to make these tournaments successful. Others could learn how to build a large tournament. I would also like to promote and recognize successful tournaments within each charter. We could recognize charters who have the largest state championships and assist those who are struggling. We could develop a strategy to help smaller charters with updating and keeping their website current. I haven't worked out all of the details as yet, but I think the NHPA could be very helpful in this respect.

Homer Cain of Oklahoma approached me with an interesting idea this week. Homer proposes to divide the US into four regions. Each region would have a major tournament that would determine the participants of each championship division at the World Tournament. According to his idea, the top three finishers in each

region in the Men's Open Division would be the top 12 participants in the World Tournament. The bottom 12 participants would be those with the 12 highest percentages who did not finish in the top 3 of their region. Each championship division would be handled the same way although some divisions would have smaller numbers. I would like to thank Homer for this idea. It will be interesting to see what others think of this intriguing idea.

Another goal is to continue to get young leaders into our organization. Josh Olson of Minnesota is one example of a future leader. Ben Webb of Kentucky has moved into the Junior Director position. Perhaps his title should be changed to Youth Director to be inclusive of the Cadet Division. It is important to continue the recruitment of young leaders. Young leaders must also be recruited on the state and local level. Many dedicated local tournament and league directors are aging and finding it difficult to continue to perform all of the necessary tasks. When these key people are gone, clubs will struggle to survive. State charters also need to recruit and train young leaders.


We are also preparing for the 2023 World Tournament in Lansing. I am predicting that we will have a minimum of 1000 entries. We are doing everything possible to make each participant's experience a positive one. We have been meeting regularly with Meghan Zeihmer, our Lansing contact. She has some great ideas to make our visit to Lansing a memorable event. Hopefully, you will see some positive changes. We will need to upgrade IT equipment and replace damaged courts. We will once again have professional photography available as Empire Media will be present for the entire tournament.

A crucial task in the immediate future will be determining the location of the 2024 World Tournament. Ocala, Florida, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and El Paso, Texas submitted bids. Unfortunately, none of these sites met financial and safety issues. The deadline for bids has been extended as several other cities have shown interest in hosting the tournament.

Another task will be to review rules and bylaws proposals that were submitted to the Rules Committee prior to the deadline of December 31, 2022. These proposals will be published in this issue of Newsline. Please read these closely and let your charter officers know how you feel about these proposals.

I appreciate the support I have received during the year. I do not have all of the answers to our many challenges, but I pledge that I will work tirelessly to make positive improvements.

## 2023 Rules/Bylaws Proposals for Review

### **PRC #1**

### **Add to Rule 1 - Pitching Divisions**

Section G - Elder Women (become eligible to pitch in the Elders Division upon purchase of an NHPA card dated for the calendar year that they become seventy (70) years old).

1. Elder Women may pitch from any place on either the extended or full-distance platform, and shall observe the twenty-four-foot (24') foul line. but they must start behind the 27 ft foul line and take one step forward while releasing the shoe.

Elder Women must notify their Charter Membership Director, in advance, of the date that they intend to begin pitching from this shorter distance. Once a member declares herself a short-distance pitcher, she must remain in that Division until the next year's membership card is purchased. At that time, she may switch back to the Open Women's Division, but must remain in that division until the next year's membership card is purchased.

2. Physically Challenged Women - Physically challenged, Female pitchers less than seventy (70) years old may be given permission, by their governing Charter, to move onto the extended platforms in the Elder Women Division observe the twenty four foot (24') foul lines but they must start behind the 27 ft foul line and take one step forward while releasing the shoe.

The prior completion and approval of a Medical Exemption Application form (available from Charter Secretaries and on some Charter Websites) is required. At the World Tournament and at State Championship Tournaments, they shall compete in the Elders Women Division.

#### Reason:

I feel that these women deserve as much consideration as the men. Some of these elder women have enjoyed the sport of horseshoe pitching for many years and would like to continue to do so. However, due to their physical inability it is becoming impossible for them to do so at the thirty foot (30') distance that these women are required to observe. Also, keep in mind that many of these women are caregivers for younger children that witness the love and enjoyment these elderly women have for this sport. No doubt many of these children will gravitate toward the sport of horseshoe pitching. This activity will help keep the women physically and mentally healthy.

### **PRC #2**

### **Current Wording:**

Rule:

REQUIREMENT 3 - CHARTER/STATE INFORMATION Section A - State Championship Play

### 3. Residency

State Championship Tournaments are open only to those NHPA members who legally reside in that State and meet the regular eligibility requirements imposed for the event. An exception to this shall be active-duty members of the U.S. Armed Forces and their immediate family (if married) who may pitch in the State Championship event of any State in which they are stationed/reside, provided they meet the other eligibility requirements of that Charter. No one will be allowed to pitch in more than one State Championship Tournament per year.

### **Proposal:**

REQUIREMENT 3 - CHARTER/STATE INFORMATION

Section A - State Championship Play

3. Residency Eligibility

"State Championship Tournaments are open to those NHPA Members who meet the residency eligibility requirements imposed for the event by the State Charter. An exception to this shall be active-duty members of the U.S. Armed Forces and their immediate family (if married) who may pitch in the State Championship event of any State in which they are stationed/reside, provided they meet the other eligibility requirements of that the

Charter. No one will be allowed to pitch in more than one State Championship Tournament per year.

### **Rationale:**

There are several reasons this adjustment for State Tournament eligibility should be made. The advent of eShoe allows anyone from any location to join any charter of their choosing, regardless of any residency definitions. Additionally, individuals in neighboring states may geographically have greater proximity and/or social-community connectivity to a charter not of their home state, including snowbirds who reside in two states (or more) for several months of the year. There is a history of NHPA granting such exceptions extending 3-4 decades in some instances. Rather than the NHPA dictating to the charters who may and may not participation in their state championship, this change codifies that the charters set all eligibility requirements to participate in their respective state tournaments.

### **PRC #3**

Rule 11; Section D; 1:

### **Current Wording:**

1. No Current Average - Any contestant without a current ringer average at their pitching distance shall pitch a minimum of one hundred (100) consecutive shoes on a sanctioned court to establish their tournament seeding percentage. This qualifying must be scored in writing and witnessed by two (2) NHPA members no more than thirty (30) days prior to the entry deadline. Note: This 100-shoe qualifier is not a sanctioned event. Alternately, NHPA Sanctioned League ringer percentage averages may be used if they are based on one hundred (100) or more shoes.

### **Proposed Wording:**

1. No Current Average - Any contestant without a current ringer average at their pitching distance shall pitch a minimum of one hundred (100) consecutive shoes on a sanctioned court to establish their tournament seeding percentage. This qualifying must be scored in writing and witnessed by two (2) one (1) NHPA members no more than thirty (30) days prior to the entry deadline. Note: This 100-shoe qualifier is not a sanctioned event. Alternately, NHPA Sanctioned League ringer percentage averages may be used if they are based on one hundred (100) or more shoes.

### Reasoning:

I would change from two NHPA players viewing to one (1) on the hundred shoe toss. Even if the stats were fudged, it would only affect the players first tournament.

### **PRC #4**

Under "III Guideline", "Section A Regular Doubles"

### **Current Wording:**

Section A - Regular Doubles

In regular doubles, both team members use the same pair of shoes and all contestants stay at the same end of the court for the entire game. To begin the game, the highest-rated contestants will decide on the first pitch and pitch their shoes, just as in singles competition. Their partners, at the opposite end, will decide on and call the score, retrieve the shoes, and pitch them back following the same procedure. The decision on who pitches first in each inning depends upon the scoring system being used, following the rules of singles play. A single score sheet should be used that clearly shows the ringers and shoes pitched by all contestants.

### **Proposed Wording:**

Section A - Regular Doubles

In regular doubles, both team members use the same pair of shoes and all contestants stay at the same end of the court for the entire game. To begin the game, the tournament director will determine who starts the pitching and how the pitching rotation continues. the highest-rated contestants will decide on the first pitch and pitch their shoes, just as in singles competition. ### **PRC #5**

Under "III Guideline", "Section B Walking Doubles, 1. Shoe-limit games"

### **Current wording:**

Section B - Walking Doubles

In walking doubles, all contestants will pitch their own shoes. A single score sheet should be used that clearly shows the ringers and shoes pitched by all contestants. 1. Shoe-limit Games - The lower-rated contestants will decide on the first pitch and pitch their four (4) shoes. The higher-rated pitchers will then pitch their four (4) shoes and all pitchers will then walk to the opposite end, decide on the scoring, and pick up their shoes. The scores of the highest rated team should be recorded first and they will also pitch first for the remainder of the game. Which one of them (and their opponents) pitches first depends upon the scoring system (cancellation or count-all) being used, following the rules of singles play. This procedure will continue until the game is over.

### **Proposed Wording:**

Section B - Walking Doubles

In walking doubles, all contestants will pitch their own shoes. A single score sheet should be used that clearly shows the ringers and shoes pitched by all contestants.

1. Shoe-limit Games - The lower-rated contestants will decide on the first pitch and pitch their four (4) shoes. The higher-rated pitchers will then pitch their four (4) shoes and all pitchers will then walk to the opposite end, decide on the seoring, and pick up their shoes. The tournament director will determine who starts the pitching and how the pitching rotation continues. The pitchers at both ends will pitch their four shoes and then walk to the other end and decide the scoring and pick up their shoes. The scores of the highest rated team should be recorded first and they will also pitch first for the remainder of the game. Which one of them (and their opponents) pitches first depends upon the scoring system (cancellation or count-all) being used, following the rules of singles play. This procedure will continue until the game is over.

### **PRC #6**

Under "III Guideline", "Section B Walking Doubles, 2. Point-limit games"

### **Current Wording:**

The tournament director will determine who starts the pitching and how the pitching rotation continues. The higher-rated contestants will decide on the first pitch and pitch their four (4) shoes. The lower-rated contestants will determine the scoring for these shoes. The partner of the pitcher who scores (or the partner of the contestant who pitched last, in case of a no-score situation) will call or record the score and will pitch first in the next inning. All pitchers will now walk to the opposite end. The highest-rated contestants will pick up their shoes (already scored) and step back. The scoring of the last four (4) shoes pitched will be determined and called or recorded. The contestant calling the score always pitches first. This procedure is continued until the game is over. For safety or other reasons, the Tournament/League Officials may select an alternative walking sequence, as long as the scoring sequence remains the same.

### **Proposed Wording:**


Section B - Walking Doubles

#### 2. Point-limit Games -

The tournament director will determine who starts the pitching and how the pitching rotation continues. The higher rated contestants will decide on the first pitch and pitch their four (4) shoes. The lower rated contestants will determine the scoring for these shoes. The partner of the pitcher who scores (or the partner of the contestant who pitched last, in case of a no-score situation) will call or record the score and will pitch first in the next inning. All pitchers will now walk to the opposite end. The highest-rated contestants will pick up their shoes (already scored) and step back. The scoring of the last four (4) shoes pitched will be determined and called or recorded. The contestant calling the score always pitches first. This procedure is continued until the game is over. For safety or other reasons, the Tournament/League Officials may select an alternative walking sequence, as long as the scoring sequence remains the same.

### **Reasoning:**

The reason for the above changes is that The NHPA does not need to suggest who pitches first in doubles.

### **PRC #7**

Under "Requirement 1 – Tournament/League", "2. During the Event."

### Add a second line to "a."

"Leagues can pitch non-members as pacers to encourage new players to participate."

### **PRC #8**

Under "Requirements 2 – All NHPA Tournaments/Leagues", "Section B"

After the word "Pacers" add:

"except in league play where non-members can be used as pacers"

### **Reasoning:**

The reason for these changes is to allow non-members a chance to pitch and participate and perhaps join the NHPA.

### **PBC #1**

By-Law changes

Under "Article IV: Executive Council", "Section 3. Meetings", "c."

Add before the word "or", "Electronic Meetings" ... by any means available

### Reason:

Just the modern way we do things.

### **PBC #2**

Under "Article V: Officers; SECTION 5:

### **Current Wording:**

All NHPA positions listed above in section 3 (a-f), who attend the World Tournament will receive a travel allowance in accordance with the current Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) guide of the NHPA. Those with dual responsibilities receive only one travel allowance.

### **Proposed Wording:**

Replace the whole section with:

"All NHPA positions listed above in Section 3 (a-f) who attend the World Tournament may request a travel allowance in accordance with the current Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) of the NHPA. The President, with council approval, has full authority to grant a request, modify the request, or deny the request. Those with dual responsibilities receive only one travel allowance."

### Reason:

It was never intended to be open to any position without regards to WT duties.

### **PBC #3**

### **Current wording:**

SECTION 8. Terms of office

a. All officers shall serve a three-year term.

### **Proposed wording:**

SECTION 8. Terms of office

a. All officers shall serve a three-year term.

#### **ADD**

b. All officers shall serve a maximum of three (3) consecutive elected terms.

Footnote: Those currently in office shall go retro beginning the first year they were elected in office.

#### **Rationale:**

Our officer team is the head of our organization. Our organization is struggling to keep membership and have more involved players. This gives members a chance to become more involved. The sayings "incumbents are almost NEVER beat" or "why should I run against an incumbent, they will win" is no longer an excuse. Having these terms limits put the organization back in the memberships hands and give a voice to those wanting to take the leap to become officers but not strong enough to run against someone with experience. We need change at the top. It is the epiphany of insanity to "do the same thing over and over and expect different results." We elect the same officers each three years and expect different results. Some of our officers have been in for almost 10 years and we are expecting different results and have not seen numerical growth or added value. Even in US politics there are term limits for our President and elected officials. We should be taking matters into our own hands as members and giving the opportunity for a fresh voice to come in and serve us.

### **PBC #4**

Article V; Section 8

### Add:

F. All Officers who have been elected to an NHPA officer position three consecutive times may not run for that office until after one election cycle for that position has been completed. If they were appointed to the position, they may not run after a third Elected consecutive term. They may not be appointed back into that position in either of these circumstances.

### **PBC #5**

By Laws; Article III; Section 7

### **Current Wording:**

SECTION 7. A membership card must be issued by the Charter in which the member maintains legal residence as determined by the filing of federal and state tax returns, voting, and/or driver license laws. Charters collecting NHPA dues for a non-residence member should give only a receipt, and then forward the dues and address information to the NHPA Secretary-Treasurer who will advise the Charter of record. Residents of a State having no active Charter may become an NHPA member by sending their dues directly to the NHPA Secretary/Treasurer.

### **Proposed Wording:**

SECTION 7. A membership card can be issued by eShoe or the Charter in which the member maintains legal residence as determined by the filing of federal and state tax returns or voting.—and/or driver license laws. The NHPA Executive Council can grant exceptions to the residency rule on a case by case basis following established council guidelines. Charters collecting NHPA dues for a non-residence member should give only a receipt, and then forward the dues and address information to the NHPA Secretary-Treasurer who will advise the Charter of record. Residents of a State having no active Charter may become an NHPA member by sending their dues directly to the NHPA Secretary/Treasurer.

### **Reasoning:**

There are some cases in which the residency rule doesn't make sense. There is an elder who resides in Texas for 6 months and has his legal residency there for tax purposes. He plays no sanction horseshoe in Texas but plays all of his tournaments and leagues in his home state. He should be allowed to buy his membership card in that state where he plays, and play in that state tournament. Another case is a player who lives very near the border of a state and pitches all of their horseshoes across the state line because there is no horseshoe activity where they live. These situations are already happening and folks see that it's common sense and it is not questioned. However, there are some small minded folks out there that will press this issue to the letter of the Bylaws and that is why I feel that the NHPA council should have the authority to grant exceptions to this requirement.


## Membership, Sponsorship, Promotion, Publicity

### World Tournament Locations/Bid Process

Several years ago, when the World Tournament was held outside, it became more difficult each year dealing with the elements, and mother nature interrupting or postponing pitching. People traveling from all over, used their vacation time from work, spent hard earned money on travel and hotels and were not able to compete because of the elements and time.

Many of the seasoned pitchers will remember years of pitching in a World Tournament outside. I have heard stories from past council members and others about what the World Tournaments were like when they were held outside. People were dropping





At Ainsworth Nebraska it was 102°degrees, the council sent three people to the emergency room due to heat exhaustion and heat stroke. After the success at Bismarck North Dakota in 2000 being indoors, Paul Stewart and Stu Sipma felt it was needed to have a world tournament coordinator to make sure this event never goes outdoors again. Now, with our current electronic score keeping system and other equipment being outside in the elements, this may not be able to happen outside. This is when Dave Loucks, CA sat down with his attorney and created the current World Tournament contract we now use. To have potential interest, cities/CVB's, the World Tournament bidders are obtained through 3 Sports Conferences (they pay for the NHPA council member to attend and is of no expense/cost to the NHPA) that show an interest in our event to possibly host a World Tournament.

An appointment portal is created by the Sports conference. You go into that portal and pick and choose the best locations, and some CVB's will request your event for appointments as well. Once the schedule of appointments is set, appointments begin each day at 9:00 am and run until 5:00 pm each day, the cities meet with us each. We then have a 3–5-minute meetings/discussions (speed dating) about our annual event. An NHPA thumb drive with all our information is given to the CVB during the appointment to take back and review. When a bell sounds the next appointment takes place and so on. This goes on an average of 2-4 consecutive days, all day long with breakout (educational) sessions available to attend. Once everyone has returned home from the conference, the information is reviewed and if a CVB/city feel that our event is a good fit for them, they will contact us, and the planning will begin at that point. Our World Tournament Director, Jim Kinney lays out the Schematics/Measurements of a venue in a CAD system to make sure our equipment will fit, then we (CVB) plan an in-person site visit.

If a city is serious about submitting a bid, an in-person site visit is scheduled and planned at the cost of the CVB/city hosting the site visit including the travel costs. These site visits last sometimes 2 days, itineraries are created by the CVB to visit various locations as well as the venue, do a walk through or tour to make sure the venue complies will all our needs. We also make sure that we are following local fire codes and city ordinances when setting up the equipment for the event. We have a detailed checklist, visit hotels, identify Hall of Fame Banquet locations, select a menu for the banquet, determine the layout and set up of the room for awards presentations, plan tourism and activities for the youth along with many other details that are discussed and potentially negotiated. Those cities that have hosted a World Tournament, and with the assistance of the local horseshoe charters/clubs, know of the time/days/weeks and the hard work of planning and organizing. The NHPA council works year-round on this event as well as many other business and tournament plans.

### 2nd VP (Membership, Sponsorship, Promotion, Publicity)...continued

As mentioned in the January 2023 edition of the Newsline, in 2022, there were several venues interested and had verbally committed to submit a bid. While contracts to bid were not yet signed, an extreme interest had been shown by several great destinations for hosting the 2024 and 2025 event. The CVB's (Convention Visitors Bureau's) obtain their funds through various resources, and federal funding options and grants, city taxes, etc., so many cities and states are still trying to financially recover from the Covid Pandemic. The Federal Government gave many cities across the U. S. funding to re-ramp their tourism and sports, industries events with the federal assistance and these cities are still seeing and experiencing funding problems. However, not all cities received the same federal funding and several cities that had verbally committed were awaiting confirmation before they could officially send in a check and a signed contract to bid. We have also discovered that some cities do not participate in the bidding processes, Indianapolis being one of them. Now, with inflation and the increasing costs of everything, cities are feeling the brunt of not being able to afford some of these events regardless of the financial impact that comes from the event.

During the most recent review of the submitted bids for 2024, and with inflation affecting everyone in in some capacity, bidders are trying to offset their expenses and want the NHPA to pay for some of the larger expenses mentioned in the NHPA contract, such as venue rental fees for 2 1/2-weeks which includes the set -up/tear down time needed, the initial purchase of the clay, shipping of the clay, rental of the mortar mixers, forklifts, etc. The clay alone for a World Tournament takes approximately 22-25 tons and runs between \$20,000-\$22,000 and does not include the shipping/delivery to a World Tournament venue. We could use other cheaper pit material per the Rules/Bylaws under court construction, but for a World Tournament, would this be acceptable? Synthetic Clay is also another option that has been discussed as an alternative, however there are requirements to maintain the clay, and to have an additional trailer to piggyback our current NHPA trailer, which is an added expense. The clay would be reused each year in place in barrels/containers and sealed on the trailer. However, the CVB's would never have to purchase the clay or pay for shipping/delivery making this a lesser cost and potentially get more locations interested in bidding.

The council received a request from a potential bidder and during our conversation/presentation with that bidder, we discovered that regardless of the language and the terms and conditions that are specifically listed in detail, some cities, and counties do not always share their funding sources with private venues or entities which cause additional expenditure's to take place that are not originally part of the contract language. This causes the event to struggle to come up with ways or ideas for a location to host a World Tournament or any event.

We have also discovered this year that regardless of the language set forth in the contract, cities will not negotiate these items because of the costs. Many cities/counties, CVB's rely on the hotel bed taxes (heads in the beds) to offset their expenses of hosting the event. For a host to put on a World Tournament now, versus the past, and with the current inflation rates, for a CVB/City to host a World Tournament for 2 1/2 weeks (includes the setup and tear down time), could get into the neighborhood of \$3-\$500,000 +/-. However, if a World Tournament attracts 1,000 - 1,300 firm entries and their families, the city can get that money in return with the hotel room tax (Heads in the Beds), local gas taxes, alcohol taxes, etc.

We, the NHPA negotiate with the hotels and the CVB's for a "Horseshoe Discounted" rate when we sign these hotels contracts. We have entertained the thought of using a new housing group to take the hotel negotiations off us. However, we are finding that cities may not bid at all if we use a housing group because they use that bed tax to offset their expense as well. Please know that the NHPA council is very diligent and detailed about the process of the bids and work with the cities in every way we can that submit these bids. The NHPA considers your overall health and safety for yourselves and your family, vacation choices, hotels, RV parks, travel and tourism information in mind when making these decisions.

### 2nd VP (Membership, Sponsorship, Promotion, Publicity)...continued

Contrary to popular belief on social media, the NHPA council wants your World Tournament experience to be a memorable and wonderful experience each year. There are numerous meetings, phone calls, emails that take place at all hours of the day and night depending on the time zones that some CVB's are located to discuss the NHPA requirements and guidelines and to see what a city has to offer when they bid. This is a very time-consuming process to get all details in place. The CVB's then give a presentation to the NHPA council for a Q&A session. At that time, the council members ask any questions they see fit to make an informed decision.

Please know that the NHPA council has everyone's health safety and welfare first and foremost and each possible bidder gets viewed in many ways, not only by asking the CVB's representatives, also checking with charter members, local health departments and checking the local newspapers, TV Stations, watching crime rates, cleanliness of the local hotels, RV parks and activities to do when not competing in a city or surrounding area. There is lots of details that must be considered overall, work and time that the NHPA council puts into selecting and trying to make the best, safest decision possible for your World Tournament Experience.

# The Lansing Center & Pets, Support animals, and the World Tournament venue requirements

The Lansing Center has specific ADA guidelines in place that must be followed. Here are the "Venue" guidelines and requirements for pets and service animals:


The Lansing Center requires that all "Service Animals" with a "Service Vest" are welcome in LEPFA facilities for guests with special needs. Animals must always remain on a leash or in a harness. If you intend to bring a service animal to a LEP-FA facility, please contact them in advance at 517-483-7400, ext. 0, and pre-register your service animal with the facility so we may be able to assist you further. Please know the venue requirements are that "No family or personal pets" are allowed in the venue.



Although your pet may be as important to you as any other

family member, not everyone feels that way, and making sure that people and the venue is comfortable with the arrangements by following a few simple guidelines is the best way to ensure that your World Tournament experience doesn't turn out to be a disaster.

While we truly understand not wanting to leave your pets, support animals in a hotel room, or in your RV



Please know that while we understand that these animals are very important to you and your needs, it is your responsibility to keep your animal under control. We do not want to see someone get bit because they want to pet the animal, especially if there are kids around or to have an animal make noise by whining or barking during competition.

Please respect the competitors, spectators, as they are there to watch and compete the same as you are. Please know that if this occurs the NHPA council members, shift directors, venue security, can and will ask you to remove the animal from the building if there are any disruptions.

### Parking Passes for Cars

Deadline to pre-purchase passes is July 1st. Otherwise, they will be available for sale during the event at the Parking Services Office at 219 N Grand Ave, Lansing, MI 48933 during normal business hours.

- \$35 for 7 consecutive days, (\$5/day). Please see daily and hourly parking info below. The passes are QR Codes that will be scanned when you enter and exit.
- The very first time you enter a lot, you must take a ticket, you don't need to keep it but it's the only way the
  gate arm will open. After that point you will need your QR code for every time you enter and exit the gates.
- Parking passes for cars are only good in lots #19, #20, #21, and #37, which are highlighted in green on the attached map.

Passes are only good for one in, and one out- as many times as you'd like but once you're in, that same pass will not grant someone else access in (No Sharing). And once you're out, that same pass will not let someone else out.

NOTE: Parking in the Lansing Center is first come, first serve. You are not guaranteed a spot but there will be overflow parking available if need be. There are baseball games from July 18th-23rd. The lots will be busy those evenings, so it would be best to arrive before 5 pm those days, except for Sunday the 23rd when it's a day game. It will be best to arrive before 12 pm on Sunday, July 23rd.

### **CHARTER WEBSITES SUGGESTIONS**

From time to time we suggest that you do an inventory/checkup of sort on your charter websites. While we try to not judge – other people do. The same rule applies in the digital realm: you want to represent your local charters and clubs in a way that is modern and clean. Let's look at the benefits of regularly updating a website and how it could impact how people perceive your charter and local clubs!

### Here are a few ideas/suggestions:

1. <u>Keeping Your Content Fresh</u> – Navigation and easy access to information and being user friendly is the key.

Updating your tabs on the top/side of your pages.

### <u>Improving Loading Speed –</u>

The faster the better (if someone is traveling through your area, and is looking for courts, they will need the GPS address of those courts, so they do not bypass your locations.

<u>Updating Your Website Design.</u> - Many people focus only on content but fail to address the design and navigation of their website. Some of the things to avoid on your website include difficult navigation, colors that are either too boring, too dark, or far too obnoxious. All these things can lead to a website that steers people away even if your content is top-notch.

<u>Keep your content Fresh</u> - Keeping the content up to date on your site helps build trust between you and your customers. Most likely, customers rely on your site for useful information.

Updated information also helps build domain authority. Domain authority, briefly explained, is how much of an authority on a particular subject your website is. For example, Wikipedia.org has one of the highest Domain authorities out there, because its content is always well researched and reviewed by editors – plus you're not distracted by unsightly or unrelated ads. Google holds this in high regard when trying to match search inquiries with useful and relevant information.

Have you ever visited a website whose copyright is 2014 and the latest blog post is years old as well? Does it make you wonder if they're still around, or if they still service your area? Having outdated content on your site, mentioning things like an old location of your courts, can be perceived by your potential visitors that your charters/clubs don't keep up with the latest trends. Anytime a person reads content on your site that makes them go "wait, I don't understand that" or "wait, that's not right", you're hurting your credibility.

We are driven by wanting to have the latest and greatest. We like for things to be new, refreshing and up to date. If this is how our culture is driven, why should your website be out of date and stale?





### Where did they go?

The NHPA has historically always struggled somewhat to get new junior pitchers, but along with the age old issue there, we also have never had a great Junior retention rate. While there are some that break the trend and continue well into adult years and even become lifelong members, the normal is for Juniors to lay down the shoes and walk away after they graduate from the Junior ranks. While there is a long list of people who've continued to pitch well into their adult years: Alan Francis, Brian Simmons, Rick Howe, Walter Ray Williams Jr, Aleena Lepak, Drew Becker, Shalee Cason, Gary Roberts, Penny Steinke,

Randy Hankins, Lindsey Hodgins, Matt Fuller, etc. For every Junior who we retain we seem to lose 2 somewhere along the way. While there are those that pitch for adult years and have success before walking away, such as 1986 Boy's world champion and 6 time Men's KY State Champion, Tony Hankins, who pitched for 3 decades before walking away. Lets go look at a few key years in recent history for example. For the sake of length of this article I'll keep it limited to Juniors at the World Tournament who would be 50 years old or younger today.

Let's take a mental field trip back to 1991. Well before the creation of the cadet divisions, 1991 featured a 12 boy/8 girl field. Looking at the results, Celeste Polak of Texas simply dominated the Girls division at 7-0 and 20% above the rest of the class. However, none of the 8 girls in the championship class that year currently hold an NHPA membership. As for the boys' division, the 12 person class wasn't as much of a blowout as the

girls. With a range of 70% and 44% between the 4th place and 12th place finishers, the top 3 in this class were the standouts. In 3rd place there was, son of Kentucky legend Charlie Meredith, and undeniably KY's strongest Junior boy in history Ronnie Meredith. In the runner-up slot was Vorn Ven of Kansas, who recently resurfaced several years ago around the Topeka World Tournament, and still plays in NHPA tournaments. Both contenders hot on the heels of arguably the greatest Junior Boy in NHPA history, Ohio's Jim Walters. This 84% win was in the middle of Jim's 5 year dominance at the world tournament from 1989-1993. Jim was one of the only people that is said to be able to regularly contend with Alan Francis at each encounter. But, for several reasons, Jim Walters along with 9 of the 12 contenders that year walked away from the adult divisions.

Skipping ahead over a decade to 2003, the year the NHPA introduced the cadet division at the World Tournament. There would now be 3 championship classes up for grabs among the Juniors. It is worth noting that son of NHPA President, Blake Roberts, the first cadet world champion, hasn't pitched in NHPA events in recent years. Beyond Blake I was unable to locate the rest of the cadet field that year in time for this article. For the girls division that year only half the 6 pitcher group remain, including champion (Tava Cook) and Runner-up (Shalee Cason). This field of Junior Boy's however has one of the best retention rates in recent years, with 6 of the 8 boys who competed in this class still holding NHPA memberships 20 years later. Including that years champion, Drew Becker, whom just last year put on a show in the final game of the Men's championship with Alan Francis. Also out of this class comes Tony White. Tony is still majorly involved with horseshoes as he stays involved with White Distributors, and assists in running the Horseshoe Tour. Unfortunately, we haven't seen Tony compete in a tournament in the past twelve months. With that being said, I'll be in Newberry at the Horseshoe Tour, Tony hopefully you'll be in Newberry, we've never pitched each other....get what I'm saying? The most interesting thing about the 2003 boys class is that all 8 boys averaged 65% or higher that year, something very abnormal, especially in recent years.

Skipping ahead another 12 years to the 2015 World Tournament, this was the year ESPN was present at the world tournament in Topeka, Kansas. For the majority of the pitchers in these classes this was their last Junior year. We cannot mention this group of Juniors without mentioning 2012 & 2013 Boy's World champion Dalton Rakestraw, who aged out the year before in 2014. Starting with the Cadets division, only half of that years field remain active in the NHPA. With 4 of the 8 not renewing their memberships in the past few years, the other 4 continue to pitch in the Junior classes, notably last years World Champion, Derek Reynolds was in this class. In the girls division, of the 6 girls that played that year only two remain active. Emily Lazaris of Wisconsin and that years world champion Denise Daly continue to pitch in NHPA tournaments, the rest of the field has quit in recent years. Out of the 8 boys who pitched in that years championships over half no longer play. Only Gunnar David (WI), Tyler Howard and myself continue to pitch just 8 years after that World Tournament.

While some, like Travis Sluys of California go on to serve our country in the armed forces, and others get busy with their careers, families, etc. It leave everyone to wonder just where that player they used to pitch with went, and how we can increase our retention of junior players. What's the answer? Is it money, different prizes, are people simply too busy? This has been an issue since the beginning of the junior classes that no-one has been able to solve. Young pitchers start playing, have great success in the junior classes, then disappear. Leaving us all who still come to the tourwonder, where did naments to they go?

bers, some items horseshoe related and some not. If you have something you'd like to donate and you are attending the tournament, please bring the item with you. If you will not be arriving within the first couple


of days of the tournament, please contact us and we'll figure something out. Perhaps one of your friends can deliver the item for you.

I love all the people and places I have the honor to visit throughout the country.



Anyone qualifying under an exception must have those scores recorded by the same date. All NHPA and any special tournament rules apply. 



### Start Now on your 2024 Hall of Fame Nominees By Vicki Winston

This has been an unusual winter in my neck of the woods, but I'm not complaining. As I write there is only a little over a week left in the month of February and this area has had very little snow. I can deal with that.

I just wanted to let you know that I have distributed the 2023 voting materials to all HOF Committee members and they are beginning to work on completing their ballots. I am hoping that I will be able to tell you the election results in the May/June NEWSLINE. As new committee members often find out, the voting process is not as easy as they thought it might be. Even the more experienced committee mem-



bers often have to struggle with trying to decide how to cast their votes. My two new committee members, Rick Bermingham and Jerry LaBrosse, are taking part in their very first voting process. I do thank them and the other committee members who have accepted appointments to serve on this important committee over the years. The newcomers did not have a lot of time to get acquainted with all of the bios I sent them for the nominees currently on the ballot. The loss of two committee members occurred as our 2023 voting process was rapidly approaching. In case you have ever wondered why we have the election so early in the year, it is because new inductees (or family members) need time to make arrangements to attend the induction ceremony, which is always held at the Banquet during the World Tournament. If they are people who have jobs, they need time to arrange for time off work and time to make travel and lodging reservations.

Since nominations have now closed for 2023, you may begin working on nominating someone for the 2024 election. As always, I remind everyone that the NHPA Hall of Fame Nomination form is on the Hall of Fame link of the NHPA website. You must use that form, or a facsimile thereof, and follow the instructions on it. No emailed forms are accepted. A hard copy must be mailed to the address on the form.

Please also remember that this is the NHPA Hall of Fame and not your charter Hall of Fame. There are many individuals who are very worthy of being honored for the work they are doing, or have done, for their charter. They are the people who keep the charter going. Players should also be honored for outstanding performances on the local or charter level. The charter should definitely honor these people by inducting them into the charter Hall of Fame.

The NHPA Hall of Fame is to honor people or players who have gone beyond the local or charter level in pitching performances or in promoting and working for our sport. We basically look at pitching performances in adult championship divisions at the World Tournament, because that is the premiere event of the NHPA. It is at the World Tournament where players usually encounter their toughest competition in their division. Also, everyone is competing on the same type of courts and at the same venue. Any other stats have come from a variety of tournaments, with a variety of pitching conditions. Also, the level of competition is usually not as great, even at a state tournament. Some Invitational Tournaments might be an exception.

The Promoter/Organizer category honors people who have gone beyond the local charter level to promote the sport of horseshoe pitching or who have worked for the NHPA in some capacity. Maybe they have served on the NHPA Executive Council. Maybe they have served on or been the Director of some NHPA committees. Maybe they have served as the NHPA Sanctioned League Director. Maybe they have been an editor of Newsline or been an NHPA webmaster.

### Hall of Fame...continued

Perhaps they have served as NHPF Directors and traveled to many meetings that have been held by the directors. Maybe they have been responsible for building the portable courts that are used at the World Tournament and helping to set them up every year. Maybe they have been in charge of the computerized scorekeeping equipment and cameras used at the World Tournament. Perhaps they have worked in the computer room at many world tournaments. Perhaps they have helped preserve the World Tournament History for future generations. Some people help in various booths during a World Tournament or help run shifts every year. Perhaps some folks have been responsible for hosting some World Tournaments. I've probably left out some possibilities of ways individuals can go above and beyond what they do on the local level, but I think you can get the idea.

Sorry to have been so wordy, but if you read this, perhaps you learned something you didn't already know. Have a good year!
